A MESSAGE FROM OUR PRESIDENT: From WA3CPO, Gary Blacksmith, MD

Fewer visitors to Blue Mountain have been noted since the four cameras were installed. Cars are not even coming up to look at the view.

The Black bear has not returned. But do remember when at Building # 3 to be aware of your surroundings at all times.

A 10 Ghz microwave connection to the Clear Channel Studios is ready for installation. A few more final approvals are coming soon. The RF link has been tested and a dish on Building # 3 has been mounted and is operational. The signal level at Clear Channel was verified using a portable dish. This path will provide over 50 Mbps to W3HP at the studio. This link is for disaster communications and not for the day to day operation of the station.

Weekly Saturday learning sessions are available to all. This starts Saturdays at 8:30 AM. We meet at McDonalds on Front Street at Linglestown Road (RTE 39), Harrisburg. After breakfast we caravan to one of many mountain top locations: Blue Mountain, Reeser's Summit, Newport, Cornwall, SPARC, Red Lion, Truce, White Rock, Waggoner's Gap, or Big Flat. There you will be able to have a hands-on experience. Many sessions are planned to be half day in length but feel free to leave at any time. An email will be sent out in advance of Saturday to let you know what is planned or if there is a postponement. Recent sessions have been held at Blue Mountain, SPARC (Manheim), Waggoner's Gap, White Rock, and Reeser's Summit. Future sessions will include all of the sites. Learning experiences will include: Mounting additional cameras, adding cameras to the firmware, adding and replacing cabling, adding remote base interfaces to UHF repeaters, repeater PM, adding network phones, installing microwave transmitters and receivers, etc.

OCTOBER MEETING:

The first part of the meeting will be a panel discussion about remote control of our many repeaters at multiple locations. The choices are:

Phone lines to all sites to devices that answer when called and are password protected.
 \$25 per month per line minimum

- 2. RF control over a separate frequency requiring an antenna, receiver and control circuits. Moderate initial expense
- 3. Computer control requiring port forwarding through existing gateways or direct from a computer on the CPIN to a power strip that has a built in web browser. Minimal cost

Computer control would save us the recurring monthly cost of multiple phone lines. Initial sites include: Blue Mtn, Reeser's Summit, Cornwall Additional sites: Ellendale, Newport (WQLV), Lams Gap, and White Rock.

Your input is valuable and any suggestions are welcome.

The second part of the meeting will be a panel discussion about the 147.375 repeater as an Asterisk/ Echolink machine. Most of us don't want a repeater that has constant chatter or frequent kerchunks. That is a risk we take. But we can take steps to minimize the undesirable aspects. If it becomes an annoyance no one will listen to it. Your input is needed. How should this repeater be set up?

Riley Hollingsworth, K4ZDH, Special Counsel for the Spectrum Enforcement Division

FCC ENFORCER RILEY HOLLINGSWORTH RETIRES:

The man who took ham radio out of the hands of trouble makers and made it family friendly once again, has retired from public service. **Riley Hollingsworth, K4ZDH**, who held the title of Special Counsel for the Spectrum Enforcement Division of the FCC's Enforcement Bureau officially retired from the agency on July 3rd.

In his final major public appearance at last May's Dayton Hamvention, he took a moment to thank the amateur radio community for its support:

Hollingsworth: "You have a great service overall, and it's a major underpinning of the communications system in this country. And you demonstrate this on a daily basis. And we thank you all for the way you help us with enforcement in your radio service and every thank-you that you give us, believe me, is deeply appreciated. Thank you. (applause)

Hollingsworth came to the position of rules enforcer more than a decade ago. It was a time when years of neglect by the FCC had permitted many of the popular ham bands to become over run by a small but vocal number of licensed amateurs who had no respect for the rights of others. These were hams who seemed to believe that the Part 97 Amateur Service rules did not pertain to them. Hams who claimed that their jamming and harassment of others was constitutionally protected freedom of expression and freedom of speech. It was Hollingsworth who would change all of that.

It was not very long before some of the most high profile offenders began receiving warning notices from Hollingsworth. Those that ignored the letters soon found that they were the subject of further FCC action. In some cases fines were issued. In others the FCC and the offender entered into agreements where the latter accepted operating restrictions or voluntarily surrendered their licenses for a given period of time.

There were also a number of license renewal set-asides. That's where a radio ham is not permitted to renew a license until a charged offense was adjudicated. It didn't take that person off the air, but was a clear message that the FCC had that operators on the air operating habits under a proverbial microscope.

That said, more than a few of the situations did not require FCC enforcement action. As Hollingsworth said in his Dayton address, many times complaints that he received got solved without any intervention at all:

Hollingsworth: "You would be amazed at the number of complaints I get that seem to be good complaints. And they are good complaints on the face of it. But if I check on them a few days later or a week or so later, the problem has gone away. A lot of it is unintentional or having second thoughts."

Whenever possible, Hollingsworth approach was that negotiation was a far better way to approach a given situation than going the route of license suspension or revocation. And in most cases it worked. In the small number where it didn't, he and others in the FCC's Enforcement Bureau were more than ready to act. And act the agency would.

In one rather egregious case in California, FCC enforcement action begun by Hollingsworth's office and that of the Los Angeles FCC Field Office lead to FBI involvement in the case of former radio ham **Jack Gerritsen**, the ex-KG6IRO.

Eventually Gerritsen was arrested, tried and convicted on six counts that included willful and malicious interference with radio communications and transmitting without a license. In 2006 Gerritsen was sentenced to seven years in prison and fined \$15,225.

But Gerritsen was the most extreme of the extreme. In most cases, the first letter and maybe a phone call was all that was needed to make a problem go away. And in his remarks at Hamvention 2008, Hollingsworth reminded the audience that the number of hams who cause problems is relatively small:

Hollingsworth: "You have some poor operators and rude operators and operators who don't care and who are hateful and bitter about life in general, but every group has that. Whether its doctors, electricians, lawyers, whatever, every group has a certain percentage of people like that in these time. But what you have to do, and remind yourself every day is to stay on the high road. And report to us if you can't resolve a problem after you have given it a chance to go away."

And taking the high road was always what Riley Hollingsworth's tenure as Special Counsel for the FCC's Spectrum Enforcement Division was always all about. And by taking the high road, he helped to breath new life into our world of Amateur Radio.

For his efforts in helping to eliminate the problem of malicious interference that had been increasing on the ham bands Hollingsworth was named to receive the 2006 Dayton Hamvention Special Achievement Award.

Now he's out of the ham radio limelight, and hopes to enjoy many years of hamming. He also hopes to talk to many of you on the air from his home station, K4ZDH.

ACS/ARES/RACES INFO: From Your Editor, Roger, W3HUP

ACS:

OK, folks, you have a new term to get used to: "ACS", or **Auxiliary Communications Service**. What is that, you ask?

The Pennsylvania ACS is <u>based on</u> RACES, but includes the use of non-amateur radio volunteers and beyond, only utilizing them during emergencies. Others who may not be

licensed amateur radio operators also provide emergency communications support through organizations such as: Radio Emergency Associated Communications Team (REACT), the Civil Air Patrol (CAP), the U.S. Coast Guard Auxiliary (USCGAUX), and others. So, when you discuss emergency communications in broad terms you should think in terms of "ACS" and should get used to hearing that acronym.

PEMA AND OTHER LOCAL NETS AND FREQUENCIES:

Central Area Net meets on 3993.5 KHz every Sunday at 8:30 AM Local. Central Area PEMA frequencies are: 3993.5 KHz - Primary, Alternates: 3984.5 KHz, 3999.5 KHz, 7248.5 KHz, and 7250.5 KHz The Eastern Area meets on 3987.5 KHz every Sunday morning at 9:00 AM Local. The Western Area meets on 3990.5 KHz every Sunday morning at 9:00 AM Local. Our PA State Net meets the FIRST SUNDAY of every month on 3993.5 kHz at 8:00 AM Local. This net is usually called by John Kruk, K3KR, Lock Haven; at which time he calls Eastern, Central and Western Area Stations in that order. The New York State net usually meets on 3993.5 kHz at 9:00 AM right after our Central Area net.

The weekly Harrisburg Amateur Radio Club Information Net is held every Wednesday at 8:00 PM local on the 146.76 HRAC repeater, except for the second Wednesday of the month which is club meeting night, and the Capital Area Skywarn Net meets Wednesday evenings at 9:00 PM local on the 145.11 RACES repeater. All are welcome to check in.

ON-LINE OPERATOR TRAINING COURSE AVAILABILITY:

NIMS (National Incident Management System) courses, including ICS 100, 200 and 700 certification are available on-line. They discuss emergency management organization and how volunteers such as us fit in to the process. The Amateur Radio Emergency Communications Course Levels 1 and 2, available from the ARRL, cover Amateur Radio emergency operating procedures. The June 2011 issue of QST Magazine (pages 80 and 81) provides an excellent introductory article on the NIMS. Page 79 of the March 2012 issue of QST contains further information on training and certification of ARES operators.
